

LIFE UNDER

Story By John Bourgaize

OCCUPATION

Born in 1938, John Bourgaize was one of 18 children. While some older siblings were evacuated, he remained on the island, living at L'Eree. He recalls running from air raids, dodging a minefield, and being knocked off his feet by an explosion when a cow set off a mine.

At four, his family moved to St. Peter's at Les Hougues Falles. He struggled in school, only speaking Guernsey French, and remembers the terrifying Mirus battery guns shaking the road. In 1944, heavy German gunfire targeted Lihou Island. Soldiers also practiced in local fields - John once fell into a trench and was chased for breaking curfew after visiting his aunt.

"often finding live bullets, we used to take the wooden cap off, place it on the road and throw stones to explode it. One day, my brother put two live bullets in the fire, and they exploded. Our mother smacked him!"

Food was scarce. Germans took supplies to a central depot, but John's father secretly buried potatoes and falsely reported them stolen. "For Christmas 1941, we had goat meat; my stocking held an apple and sweets." Later Christmases brought rabbit, potatoes, broccoli, and boiled seaweed for dessert. There were no toys, only clothes. His worst memory was eating potato cake made from green skins, which made him sick.

Thomas and Mary Jehan lived at Mon Port, Plaisance Road at the western side of the airport runway. On rising and opening the curtains one morning, Thomas was shocked to discover an anti-aircraft gun had been set up close to the house and an accompanying German was peering back at him through the window!

> Thomas was a grower, and Mary was the daughter of Nico Le Sauvage a fisherman from L'Eree. They had four children, Nora, Mary, Elsie and Thomas. Thomas Jr married Enid Lucas, just prior to the outbreak of the second world war and also lived at Mon Port throughout the occupation and their eldest child (who now resides at Mon Port) was born during this time.





HOME AND AWAY

In June 1940, of the thousands of children evacuated from our Island. 198 were from Guernsey's southern and western parishes. With many leaving behind parents, possessions, and everything they knew.

Their journeys took almost a full day, with some experiencing trains for the first time. Many siblings were separated, facing challenges with new dialects and varying care experiences. However, strong community and school support often helped bring evacuees together.

For those who remained, schooling was difficult due to teacher shortages. Margaret Le Cras recalled walking long distances, seeing German soldiers daily, and only speaking patois. "Our teacher, Mrs. Pearl Blondel, taught us English. We gathered pinecones for the boiler in winter to stay warm." Len Le Ray. then an infant in St. Saviour, remembered feeling his parents' fear and being terrified on his first day at Torteval Methodist.

Pupils from La Houguette School have been learning of the hardships faced by Guernsey's children during those long 5 years and will reenact the Parade celebrations of 1946. on May 9th.



LIFE AS AN

EVACUEE!

Rosemary Smale (nee Barrett) was just four when she left Guernsey on a cattle boat with a family friend. Her brother travelled separately, and their parents joined them later in Liverpool, Their initial homes in Liverpool were soon bombed, forcing Rosemary's family to shelter in a broom cupboard beneath the stairs. Her father then moved the family to Stockport, where sirens frequently sounded, sending them rushing to an Anderson shelter next door, often helping elderly neighbours along the way. Rosemary vividly recalls nearby bombings and hearing spitfires overhead.

Despite this, Rosemary remembers her life in Stockport fondly, quickly making friends and adjusting well to school life, even amid gas masks and air raid drills. "Church was attended every Sunday, and there was freedom to play and explore. School and community parties were fun, and I wasn't overly worried," she reflects.

Returning home to Guernsey after the war was unsettling for Rosemary. Their new home in St. Martins felt eerily quiet and desolate, contrasting sharply with the bustling life she'd known in the UK. Yet she understood her parents' joy at being home, saying, "I thank the Lord that they did return."

& Reconciliation

During the occupation, over 1,000 Guernsey and Sark residents were deported to camps in the southwest of Germany, notably to Biberach an der Riß and interned at Camp Lindele (Lager Lindele). It was to be their involuntary home for almost 3 years. Today, Guernsey and Biberach are 'twinned' in a flourishing friendship via the Guernsey Friends of Biberach group.

Gladys Skillett, a civilian internee, was expecting her second child when she was deported from German-occupied Guernsey to Biberach. Alone in the hospital, she befriends a German woman in the same maternity ward, and despite the language barrier, their friendship endures for the rest of their lives.



A ROYAL CELEBRATION.



We are honoured to welcome Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal to the 80th Anniversary Liberation Day celebrations at L'Eree on Friday 9 May. Her visit highlights the historical significance of the Channel Islands' Liberation, marking eight decades since the end of German Occupation (1940-1945), when the islands became the most fortified part of the Atlantic Wall.

Liberation began on 9 May 1945 with the historic arrival of HMS Bulldog in St Peter Port, where German forces officially surrendered at dawn. To commemorate this milestone, The Princess Royal will join islanders at L'Eree, meeting veterans, evacuees, volunteers, and community organisers involved in the day's events.

Lieutenant-Governor Lieutenant General Richard Cripwell remarked, "It will be a great privilege to welcome The Princess Royal... offering a powerful reminder of the value of freedom."

The Princess Royal's visit reflects her deep appreciation of military and naval history, making her attendance particularly significant as we honour those who lived through Occupation and remember the sacrifices made for our liberty.
